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I. Sometimes we don't want to hear what God's Word has to say...

The words of Amos, who was among the shepherds of Tekoa, which he saw concerning Israel in the days of Uzziah king of Judah and in the days of Jeroboam the son of Joash, king of Israel.... And he said: "The Lord roars from Zion and utters his voice from Jerusalem; the pastures of the shepherds mourn, and the top of Carmel withers." (1:1,2)

Sometimes the Lord roars like a lion in judgment because of the many sins of the world.

Thus says the Lord: "For three transgressions of Damascus, and for four, I will not revoke the punishment.... Thus says the Lord: "For three transgressions of Gaza, and for four, I will not revoke the punishment.... Thus says the Lord: "For three transgressions of Tyre, and for four, I will not revoke the punishment.... Thus says the Lord: "For three transgressions of Edom, and for four, I will not revoke the punishment.... Thus says the Lord: "For three transgressions of the Ammonites, and for four, I will not revoke the punishment.... Thus says the Lord: "For three transgressions of Moab, and for four, I will not revoke the punishment.... (1:3,6,9,11,13; 2:1)

God's judgment is not limited to other people or "those people out there."

Thus says the Lord: "For three transgressions of Judah, and for four, I will not revoke the punishment, because they have rejected the law of the Lord, and have not kept his statutes, but their lies have led them astray, those after which their fathers walked. So I will send a fire upon Judah, and it shall devour the strongholds of Jerusalem." Thus says the Lord: "For three transgressions of Israel, and for four, I will not revoke the punishment, because they sell the righteous for silver, and the needy for a pair of sandals—those who trample the head of the poor into the dust of the earth and turn aside the way of the afflicted; a man and his father go in to the same girl, so that my holy name is profaned; they lay themselves down beside every altar on garments taken in pledge, and in the house of their God they drink the wine of those who have been fined.

(2:4-8)

Outward religion alone will not save us from God's judgment; God hates both injustice and immorality.

Hear this word that the Lord has spoken against you, O people of Israel, against the whole family that I brought up out of the land of Egypt: "You only have I known of all the families of the earth; therefore I will punish you for all your iniquities. (3:1,2)

Our outward relationship with God makes us more accountable for our sins.

Religion without repentance is worthless; religion is not an excuse to sin.

II. But we must listen and obey.

"Do two walk together, unless they have agreed to meet? Does a lion roar in the forest, when he has no prey? Does a young lion cry out from his den, if he has taken nothing? Does disaster come to a city, unless the Lord has done it? "For the Lord God does nothing without revealing his secret to his servants the prophets. The lion has roared; who will not fear? The Lord God has spoken; who can but prophesy?" (3:3-8)

As a prophet, Amos has no real choice but to speak the Word of the Lord.

"Hear this word.... The Lord God has sworn by his holiness that, behold, the days are coming upon you, when they shall take you away with hooks, even the last of you with fishhooks.... "I gave you... lack of bread in all your places, yet you did not return to me," declares the Lord. "I also withheld the rain from you when there were yet three months to the harvest; yet you did not return to me," declares the Lord.... "I struck you with blight and mildew; your many gardens and your vineyards, your fig trees and your olive trees the locust devoured; yet you did not return to me," declares the Lord. (4:1,2,6,7,9,10)

Hear this word that I take up over you in lamentation, O house of Israel:...."I hate, I despise your feasts, and I take no delight in your solemn assemblies. Even though you offer me your burnt offerings and grain offerings, I will not accept them; and the peace offerings of your fattened animals, I will not look upon them. Take away from me the noise of your songs; to the melody of your harps I will not listen. But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream. (5:1,21-24)

The Lord takes no delight in hypocritical and unrepentant worship.

The Lord desires justice and righteousness as the fruit of real faith and repentance.

Then Amaziah the priest of Bethel sent to Jeroboam king of Israel, saying, "Amos has conspired against you in the midst of the house of Israel. The land is not able to bear all his words. For thus Amos has said, "Jeroboam shall die by the sword, and Israel must go into exile away from his land." And Amaziah said to Amos, "O seer, go, flee away to the land of Judah, and eat bread there, and prophesy there, but never again prophesy at Bethel, for it is the king's sanctuary, and it is a temple of the kingdom." v.10-13

Then the Lord said... the high places of Isaac shall be made desolate, and the sanctuaries of Israel shall be laid waste, and I will rise against the house of Jeroboam with the sword." (7:9)

Some people prefer allegiance to their group over allegiance to God's Word.

Then the officials said to the king, "Let this man [Jeremiah] be put to death, for he is weakening the hands of the soldiers who are left in this city, and the hands of all the people, by speaking such words to them. For this man is not seeking the welfare of this people, but their harm." (Jer. 38:4)

"If you release this man [Jesus], you are not Caesar's friend. Everyone who makes himself a king opposes Caesar." (Jn.19:12)

"These men [Paul and Silas] are Jews, and they are disturbing our city." (Acts 16:20)

We must be willing to obey, no matter how awkward, unpopular, or unwanted.

Peter and the apostles answered, "We must obey God rather than men. (Acts 5:29)
